	<p style="text-align: center;">“How to leverage EITI Reports for reforms in sector governance”</p> <p>The session aims to facilitate discussions among countries regarding specific strategies that are needed to operationalize the identified priorities in the previous session. This would include identifying stakeholder engagement needs, undertaking capacity gaps and resource assessment, identifying action points, activities and timeframes to deliver on the opportunities identified, and prioritising which issues to focus on.</p> <p>The session will also include a discussion on how to leverage EITI reports towards improved sector reforms. The aim of this session is to identify how to use the EITI process to formulate recommendations for reform. It also aims to discuss methods of monitoring EITI implementation, ensuring continuous improvement, capturing impact and reflecting these in the Annual Progress Reports. It will also be an opportunity to share lessons learnt, challenges and good practices in terms of outreach, awareness raising and guidance to companies in order to ensure effective implementation of beneficial ownership transparency. Topics to be covered include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - What are the common concerns of companies with regards to beneficial ownership disclosure?
