Introduction

The EITI requires effective multi-stakeholder oversight, including a functioning multi-stakeholder group that involves the government, companies, and the full, independent, active and effective participation of civil society.

The key requirements related to multi-stakeholder oversight include: (1.1) government engagement; (1.2) industry engagement; (1.3) civil society engagement, including <u>EITI Protocol:</u> <u>Participation of civil society</u>, and (1.4) the establishment and functioning of a multi-stakeholder group.

Objectives and Mission of Philippine EITI	 Executive Order No. 147, series of 2013: Creating the Philippine Extractive Industries Transparency Initiative Amended Terms of Reference of PH-EITI MSG, Section 1 	In fulfillment of its objectives and mission, PH-EITI, annually publishes reports which contain the data on payments and receipts from participating extractive companies. The reported data are shared to various stakeholders through an annual national conference. To ensure that the perspectives of the stakeholders at the sub-national level are considered, an annual roadshow is conducted in regional venues with prevalent extractive operations. The scope of the report, and the structure of the national conference and roadshows are determined by the MSG.
II. Principles of Engagement	 Amended Terms of Reference of PH-EITI MSG, Section 2 PH-EITI Internal Rules, Article I. 	The MSG follows the principles of local ownership, transparency, accountability, integrity, inclusivity, partnership, consultation, capacity-building, empowerment, respect for internal processes, sustainability and national interest. Following are some of the activities, in accordance with the annual work plan, in which the principles of engagement are practiced: 1. The Annual National Conference and the Regional Roadshow- The MSG ensures that stakeholders at both the national and sub-national levels,

openly and safely raise their concerns to national agencies and industry leaders, on transparency and accountability in the transactions of extractives industries affecting their areas.

In the 2020 OnLearn¹ Phase 2 (Synergizing Transparency for Sustainability: Making Extractive Information Work for Members of the Community), was designed to provide a venue where community can understand the relevance of EITI in strengthening natural resource governance at the sub-national level, on the other hand, hand gather insights on how local communities can participate in the EITI process.

- 2. The MSG Meetings, including TWG and special meetings are venues and opportunities for the MSG members to express their points of view on matters regarding extractives industries and natural resource governance, but upholding the consensual agreement.
- 3. The MSG holds **regular capacity building activities** to enhance and share knowledge on various facets of natural resource governance.
- a. **2019 Year-end Assessment and Strategic Planning**, (November 3-4, 2019) which resulted in the enhancement of the objectives PH-EITI, and review of the roles and responsibilities of the MSG in preparation for mainstreaming, and the 2020 work plan.
- b. 2020 Legislative Advocacy Training and Planning workshop (July 14,16, 23, 2020) in which they set the strategies to institutionalize the standards of transparency and accountability in the extractive industries.
- MSG Webinar on the 6th Report (July 28, 2020) provided a venue for an in-depth understanding of the concepts behind the data, some terms that are often present in EITI country reports.

¹ In lieu of the LGU Roadshow that requires physical gathering, the PH-EITI developed the Online Learning on Extractives or On Learn, a series of webinars arranged in regional clusters that will allow stakeholders to continue dialogue and exchange ideas in pursuit of sustainable development.

A. Latest EITI Work plan

During the <u>2020 OnLearn</u>, updates on government agencies efforts to implement EITI were shared, and feedback was solicited from the stakeholders. The consolidated feedback from various clusters were used as reference in crafting some of the key result areas and programs in the <u>2021 PH-EITI work plan</u>.

Each implementing government agency also described how it sought inputs from its respective constituencies.

1. Department of Finance

DOF is not an implementing agency, but the principal agency of some of the EITI implementing agencies. Thus, DOF coordinates with these implementing agencies. Submissions of reports and updates are communicated by the DOF MSG representatives to the PH-EITI Secretariat for inclusion in the workplan.

2. Department of Environment and Natural Resources-Mines and Geosciences Bureau EITI related matters, activities/programs are being consulted/communicated to the rest of the agency through staff meetings and management conferences (MANCON).

3. Department of the Interior and Local Government

If the activity involves DILG Regional Offices and LGUs, the process is through the issuance of a memorandum coursed through DILG Regional Offices and cascaded down to the provincial/ city municipal field offices with retrieval coursed through the same channels.

There are also instances where EITI-related concerns are coursed through the LGU Leagues to cause widest dissemination.

4. Department of Energy

There was no consultation undertaken with the constituents regarding the EITI work plan.

B. Annual Review of Outcomes and Impact

An online version of the PH-EITI Annual Roadshow, the Online Learning on Extractives also dubbed as "OnLearn," which was conducted in 13 regional clusters, served as a venue to seek inputs and feedback on the outcomes and impacts of the PH-EITI implementation. During the event, the 6th Country Report and updates from various government agencies involved in EITI implementation were presented to various stakeholders, which include members of local government units, national government agencies, extractive industries, and civil society organizations. Focus group discussions through break-out sessions were held to solicit inputs and feedback from the stakeholders as well as to gather insights on how they are utilizing EITI data as well as how they participate in data generation.

Each implementing government agency also described how it sought inputs from broader constituencies.

1. Department of Finance

DOF is not an implementing agency, but the principal agency of some of the EITI implementing agencies. As such, DOF coordinates with these implementing agencies and communicates the results through the DOF MSG representatives to the MSG and to the PH-EITI Secretariat.

2. Department of Environment and Natural Resources-Mines and Geosciences Bureau
The MGB monitors the participation of Mining Companies, and reflects the result in the
annual report. The agency also monitors the impact of its implementation through the EITI
stakeholders engagement.

3. Department of the Interior and Local Government

The general rules followed by the industries are <u>Section 2, EO 147</u>, <u>Section IV of the PH EITI Amended TOR</u>, and <u>Title II, Section 2 of PH-EITI Internal Rules and Regulations:</u>

The Business Group shall designate five (5) full and five (5) alternate representatives to the PH-EITI MSG through its own independent processes and governance mechanisms.

Chamber of Mines of the Philippines (COMP)

COMP, representing the minerals industry sector, selects its regular representatives to the PH-EITI MSG from its incumbent 15-man Board of Trustees.

Petroleum Association of the Philippines (PAP)

PAP represents the oil & gas sector.

The selection process is as follows:

Any active company representative may nominate another company representative through a written and signed nomination. The PAP's Executive Committee shall screen and validate all nominations and submit the list of nominees who have met the qualification requirements to PAP's Board of Directors for final voting and appointment. The Executive Committee's list shall be final, and no further appeal or objection shall be considered.

At the Board of Directors' meeting duly called for the purpose, and with a quorum present, the voting of PAP's permanent and alternate representatives to the PH-EITI MSG shall be decided by a show of hands. The nominees with the highest and second highest number of votes shall be declared as PAP's permanent and alternate representatives, respectively, to the PH-EITI MSG.

1. Chamber of Mines of the Philippines (COMP)

COMP followed its procedure in selecting regular representatives to the PH-EITI MSG.

Nominees are pre-selected by an Executive Committee composed of the Board Chairman, Vice Chairman, and three senior board members. Interviews are conducted and nominees' consents are obtained by the committee before their names are presented to the Board for comment and/or approval. The formal selection and appointment of representatives is done in a Board meeting called for the purpose.

The Executive Committee selects nominees from the board on a rotating basis, with the thrust being to involve all trustees in PH-EITI. Representatives to the PH-EITI MSG do not have a fixed term and serve at the pleasure of the Chamber board, or until they determine that they are no longer able to fully perform their functions.

For institutional memory, and to ensure the Chamber's in-depth involvement in PH-EITI, the Executive Director of the Chamber is always made a representative, either in a permanent or alternate capacity.

The Secretary of PAP's Board of Directors shall notify the nominees in writing of their appointment as permanent or alternate representatives to the PH- EITI MSG.

The appointment shall be for a term of 2 years.

"This is important from a transparency perspective as it is only through the actual extraction process that we can verify the compliance to the principles of EITI. This is the reason why companies like Nido, SPEX, Chevron and Petro China staff are appointed as MSG Representatives." In the next AGM/Board Meeting this year, PAP will be appointing a new representative to the PH-EITI MSG.

Currently, the PAP President serves as an MSG member.

Agreed procedure for replacing industry MSG members

As stipulated in Title II, Article 1, Section 4 of the PH-EITI Internal Rules, replacements of MSG members or voluntary resignation of any member shall be in accordance with the respective rules and independent processes of the sector concerned, provided that such replacement shall only serve for the unexpired term of the representative replaced. The affected sector shall notify the MSG in writing such vacancy within two days from its occurrence, and shall fill up the position within fifteen working days from such notification.

It is the responsibility of each sector to ensure the continuity of representation and institutional memory within the PH-EITI-MSG, as mandated by Executive Order 147, series of 2013.



In discussions in Chamber of Mines of the Philippines (COMP) member companies, the most often cited factor that hinders participation in PH-EITI are:

- 1. **Reporting fatigue.** Mining companies (especially members of the Chamber of Mines) are required to submit multiple reports that often overlap, and/or are often perceived as duplications;
- 2. **Challenges to data privacy** and the lack of clear guidance/rationale on beneficial ownership disclosure;

For mining companies (and the Chamber of Mines), there is also a dearth of venues and/or opportunities for participation in EITI activities. There is currently no structure or system in place where Philippine private sector representatives can liaise or discuss EITI matters with counterparts in the SEA region, or the rest of the world.

For PAP, the President expressed that there is now a system in place to submit the data required by EITI and in particular the comparison between company submission and the amount received by the government. From a PAP perspective, these are publicly available data, given that these are submitted to DOE should not be a barrier to the industry's participation. The cost recovery component is also well audited by DOE/COA. Moving forward, the focus should be more on how the government takeoff of 60% is being utilized to improve the country's Energy Security and how the industry is being developed to be sustainable.

Applicants/nominees are required to submit their respective CV and endorsement letter from their org.

A board composed of individuals (not necessarily BK members) will select among the nominees/applicants who will fill the Permanent and Alternate new MSG member representatives. Results of the In 2018, the following process for nominating civil society MSG members were followed:

Bantay Kita announced the call for applications for civil society members of the PH-EITI MSG. The call was posted on Bantay Kita's website, social media accounts and announced by email through its members and network.

The call for applications included attachments on the selection criteria, application form, and letter of support or nomination.

A Selection Committee is convened to deliberate and select the representatives that will fill the permanent and alternative MSG members.

In the event that a Permanent or Alternate member resigns, the same selection process will be followed to fill the vacancy.	In 2018, the following process for nominating and replacing civil society MSG members were followed: (1) Re-convene the Selection Committee In a BK Board meeting on December 8, 2017, the Secretariat was tasked to reconvene the CSO Selection Committee to help identify individuals who would best represent civil society's interest in the PH-EITI MSG. Invitation to be part of the selection committee again was sent out by January 5, 2018. (2) Discuss process and criteria CSO Selection The Secretariat suggested abiding by the process agreed on as a Selection Committee in 2016: deliberation of applicants would be conducted by consensus. Selection Committee Members would identify their choices based on the review of pertinent documents submitted, against the criteria set. The proposed timeline was shared with the Committee and agreed upon. (3) Prepare application form and letter of support/nomination Bantay Kita revised the application form based on the Board's recommendation to keep the application form simple. To submit, a letter of support/nomination along with the application form is optional.

As per the approved timeline, the application process for CSO representatives was open on January 25, 2018, with the initial deadline for submission of applications on February 16. The call was posted on Bantay Kita's website, social media accounts, and announced by email through its network, including the PH-EITI secretariat for dissemination.

(5) Extend the call for applications

Due to the small number of applicants, the call for application was extended until February 23. The Secretariat announced again in different channels – social media, email network members and organization, and asking for the outgoing CSO members' help in searching for more applicants for the CSO MSG representative.

(6) Present the applicants and extend call for applications

On April 17, 2018 the applicants/nominees were introduced to the CSO General Assembly during the BK National Conference. The Secretariat also called for applicants during the conference. The current applicants still weren't enough to fill all vacancies. BK intended to get a more diverse pool in terms of expertise, geographic representation, and gender. Thus, the call for applications was extended until April 27.

(7) Deliberation

On May 2, all applications for the CSO MSG were sent to the Selection Committee for deliberation. A total of eleven (11) applicants were received by the Secretariat. The objectives, criteria and vacancies were mentioned again to the Committee. The deadline of May 10 was agreed to complete the deliberation.
